

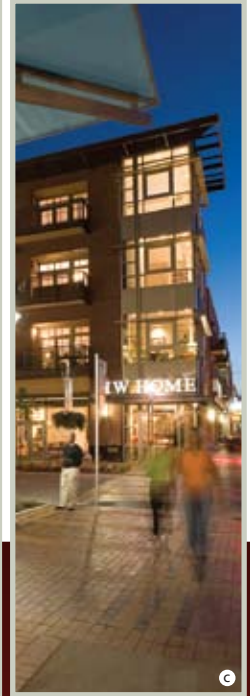

DEAR AIA COLORADO MEMBERS:

We are proud to present our 2007 annual report. We decided to provide the full version of this report in electronic-only format as part of the national Walk The Walk environmental campaign that AIA introduced. A hardcopy summary of this report also appears in the summer 2008 issue of *Architect Colorado*.

2007 marked the 150th anniversary of The American Institute of Architects. We celebrated in Colorado by working on several projects at the local level. All four chapters took on large initiatives—from AIA Denver’s 60-minute film on transit-oriented development, to AIA Colorado South’s work with Colorado Springs in developing a 3-D graphic model of the downtown area for use in future planning, zoning and design studies. Recently, we reviewed the programs we are providing to the membership throughout the state. We realized the number of programs doubled from approximately 47 in 2003 to 96 in 2007. At the state level, we continue to streamline board planning and operations. We created a series of new policies and procedures, enabling the board to focus more on strategic discussions. In early 2008, the state component created a new mission-vision statement. Based on this statement, strategic initiatives were developed for the four local chapters, which can be viewed in each local chapter’s section within this report. AIA Colorado continues to review and update its strategic plan annually. The plan outlines one- to five-year goals focusing on servicing the membership, communication, public outreach, government affairs and more. AIA COLORADO MISSION-VISION STATEMENT:

AIA Colorado, the voice of the profession of architecture, inspires and supports its members as leaders to improve and sustain the quality of the built environment. We promote the value of the profession and provide resources and education for members.

2007 LEGISLATIVE SUMMARY

The AIA Colorado Legislative Subcommittee, chaired by Chris Greenwald, AIA, reviewed 379 House and 263 Senate Bills in 2007. Thanks and acknowledgments go to Mike Wisneski, AIA; Jered Minter Assoc. AIA; and Ed Kammerer, AIA, for reviewing and analyzing the bills as members of this subcommittee. Special thanks to Jerry Johnson, the AIA Colorado lobbyist, for his invaluable insight and support in understanding the entire legislative process.

The AIA Colorado Legislative Subcommittee is charged with reviewing bills in the following priority. Legislation that:

1. directly affects the practice and regulation of architecture;
2. is of an architectural nature, including planning, zoning, transportation and engineering;
3. affects the construction industry, including capital funding;
4. relates to the built environment, such as affordable housing;
5. affects the business of architecture;
6. is any other legislation directed by AIA Colorado Government Affairs Committee or other AIA Colorado committees, including the Board of Directors;
7. is any other legislation requested to be monitored by affiliated associations, such as the American Council of Engineering Companies of Colorado or Associated General Contractors of Colorado.

Specific bills that AIA Colorado followed related to sustainable design, integrated project delivery, renewable energy, eminent domain, payment of construction contracts, interior designer registration and licensing of landscape architects. Two bills to highlight are:

HB07-1146: Energy Conservation Building Codes, Rep. Levy and Sen. Gordon

This law requires every board of county commissioners and every governing body of a municipality that has enacted a building code to adopt an energy code that meets or exceeds the standards in the 2003 International Energy Conservation Code as minimum requirements

that apply to the construction of, and renovations and additions to, all commercial and residential buildings in the county or municipality. The law is an enabling law that reinterprets the ability to adopt energy conservation building codes where previously it was not clear the county or municipality could do so.

The Legislative Subcommittee, following guidelines from AIA, strongly supports the adoption of the International Family of Building Codes. HB07-1146 was signed into law by the Gov. Ritter on May 3, 2007.

SB07-051: High Performance State Buildings, Sen. Gordon and Rep. Witwer

SB-051 requires all state-assisted facilities of at least 5,000 sq. ft., receiving at least 25 percent of the project cost from the state government, achieve the highest performance certification attainable pursuant to the High Performance Standard Certification Program (waivers apply in only three very specific and limited conditions). That HPSCP, run by the Office of the State Architect, defines the certification level of LEED™ Gold, the highest required level in the nation. The costs of the green strategies relating to LEED™ would be recovered by conservation savings over the first 15 years of operation.

The executive order, signed at the same time as SB-051, further developed the state's green initiatives by:

1. renaming the OEMC to the Governor's Energy Office;
2. issuing new "Greening of State Government" goals and objectives;
3. introducing a new Climate Change Advisor to the GEO
4. Signing four pieces of legislation on the "New Energy Economy," including SB-126, SB-145 and HB-1087

The AIA Denver Committee on the Environment Advocacy Subcommittee, AIA Colorado Government Affairs Committee and AIA Colorado Board of Directors were all actively engaged in assisting with writing, lobbying and testifying in support of this bill. SB07-051 was signed into law by Gov. Ritter on April 16, 2007.

MEMBERSHIP

In 2007, AIA Colorado was privileged to receive a Component Excellence Award for Membership – Outstanding Overall Program from AIA (national). A prestigious honor, the award was the first of its kind for AIA Colorado in this category and recognized the record increase in membership, retention and service efforts.

2007 proved to be a banner year for one of the local chapters. AIA Denver was named the 13th Big Sibling chapter of AIA. Comprised of chapters with more than 1,000 members, the “Big Sib” group enables sharing of best practices among the largest segments of membership. AIA Denver is proud of the accomplishment and excited to collaborate with fellow chapters in the coming years.

Membership Numbers (by chapter and state)

As of December 2007, membership numbers were:

2,418 total members in AIA Colorado:

- 1,420 AIA members
- 565 Associate AIA members
- 227 Professional Affiliate members
- 206 Student Affiliate members

1,534 total members in AIA Denver (63.5 percent)

413 total members in AIA Colorado North (17 percent)

196 total members in AIA Colorado South (8 percent)

275 total members in AIA Colorado West (11.5 percent)

Membership surveys were conducted to learn about member preferences in the areas of programs, communication and advocacy. AIA Colorado will continue conducting member surveys in 2008. Questions will focus on topics related to member needs and cover all levels of membership. The AIA Colorado Board of Directors uses the information gathered for strategic planning.

ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE

The AIA state component and local chapters in Colorado operate under a unique structure, similar to only a few states in the United States. Colorado has been discussed as a model for other AIA chapters. In 1997 a restructuring agreement between AIA Colorado and the four local chapters was created. Prior to that time, only AIA Colorado and AIA Denver were staffed. This agreement stipulated that the state board (AIA Colorado) collects all membership dues (eliminating local chapter dues). In exchange, AIA Colorado provides:

- A \$10,000 annual grant to each local chapter.
- Allocation of 50 percent of the total corporate sponsorship revenue collected, which is then divided among the local chapters based on membership size.
- Support from AIA Colorado for operational expenses, including staff and office support services.

The president of each local chapter sits on the state (AIA Colorado) board as a voting director. State (AIA Colorado) and local chapters do not compete for programs or sponsors. The state component (AIA Colorado) handles all state legislation and government affairs issues. Local chapters may weigh in on state matters through the AIA Colorado Government Affairs Committee and the AIA Colorado Board of Directors. Local chapters handle all local issues. The AIA Colorado board may weigh in on local issues through the local chapter boards.

This program has worked successfully now for more than 10 years. As a result, the state component and local chapters work together in a unique and symbiotic way. Chapters continually share ideas with one another and are able to pool resources to create more significant programs and outreach.

SUMMARY OF 2007 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The challenge for 2007 was based on a single word:

“engage (en gāj, in-) vi.

1. to pledge oneself; promise; undertake; agree
2. to occupy or involve oneself; take part; be active;
3. to enter into conflict
4. to interlock; mesh.”^[1]

The word “engage,” used in any one of these four definitions (as an intransitive verb) defines how many architects encounter and participate in our society. The AIA Colorado Board of Directors challenged the organization in 2007 to engage in all four senses of the word:

1. to make a pledge to engage in our community (advocacy, and to engage our community in a discussion of the impact of design excellence);
2. to involve ourselves in the key issues on which architects are positioned to be leaders (sustainability, growth, transportation);
3. not to shrink from conflict or to take a stand when it may be controversial but when we know it to be right; and
4. to interlock and mesh, both as components and committees, working together and as a statewide organization fully participating in the workings of society.

As architects, our knowledge base must be broad, drawing upon the diverse aspects of our profession. This positions us to be leaders—if we are only willing to accept the challenge and if we can synthesize our artistic/reflective/theoretical side with our activist/analytical/societal inclinations.

AIA Colorado 2007 Highlights:

- AIA Colorado began documenting the contributions to AIA and the industry by some of its longstanding members by creating a series of videos through the History Committee. The videos will be available for checkout and used as an educational tool for emerging professionals.
- AIA Colorado worked on plans to start an AIA disaster assistance program throughout the state, offering the services of architects to help in major disasters. The program chair, Kaki Zeeb, AIA, attended training in September. The program will continue to evolve in 2008.

- AIA Colorado worked with the AIA Denver Committee on the Environment to support legislation involving sustainable building practices in the state.
- AIA Colorado issued a series of short e-surveys regarding advocacy, membership and communication in order to find better ways to meet the needs of members.
- The AIA Colorado Government Affairs Committee continued to develop relationships with state legislators and educate them on issues important to architects in Colorado.
- Colorado Architecture Week continued to grow in attendance and public recognition. A two-page spread was featured in the *Rocky Mountain News* about Colorado Architecture Week activities.
- The emerging professionals programs were re-examined and reorganized to best serve the needs of students, associates and young architect members.
- A series of radio ads were created and broadcasted on FM101.5 (Martini on the Rockies) regarding the importance of working with an AIA architect. Ads will continue through 2008 on 97.3 (KBCO) and Colorado Public Radio.
- The Architectural Education Foundation awarded more than \$58,000 in scholarships, grants and other awards to students, interns, architects, teachers and allied organizations.
- AIA Colorado was recognized by AIA (national) with a component excellence award for membership recruitment and retention.

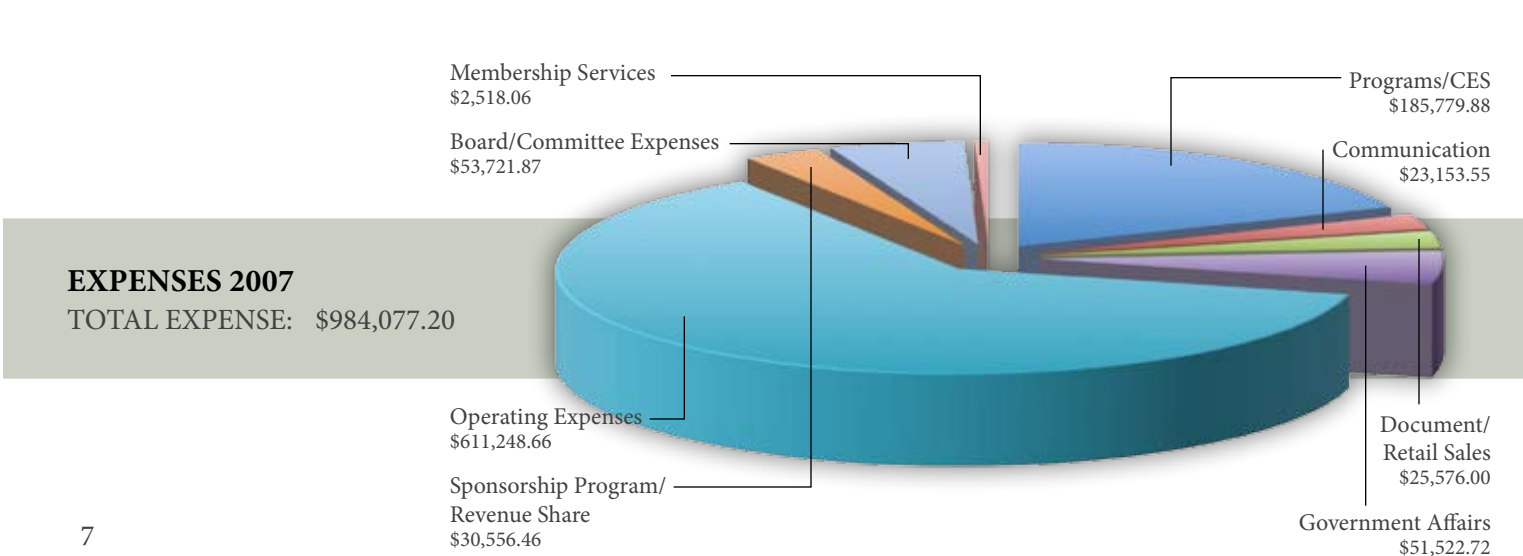
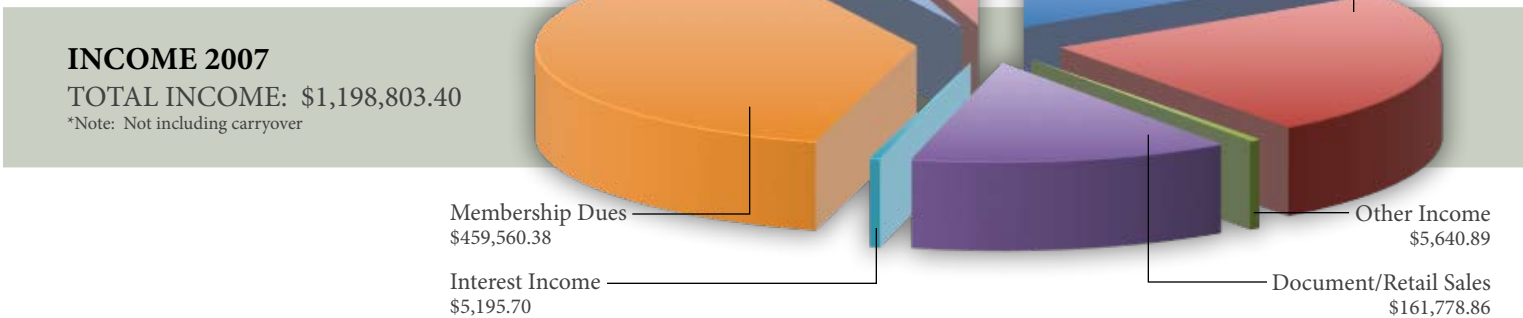
- we have become financially stable and worked to ensure future stability,

The AIA Colorado 2007 Design Conference & Practice Management Symposium took place Nov. 1-3 at the Vail Cascade Resort & Spa. More than 350 professionals from across the state attended this exciting event.

The conference opened with the Practice Management Symposium, a day of seminars designed to give attendees the opportunity to learn practical skills for managing a design firm or business. Session topics ranged from presentation skills and career pathing to building information modeling and greening a design practice.

The conference continued with innovative presentations from nationally and internationally renowned architects and professionals. Speakers included Brian MacKay-Lyons, Hon. FAIA (Halifax, Nova Scotia); Lindy Roy (New York); Jonathan Segal, FAIA (San Diego); L. William Zahner, Hon. AIA (Kansas City); and Julie Snow, FAIA (Minneapolis).

The conference concluded with the 2007 Design Awards Gala, AIA Colorado's "event of the year." Thirteen design awards were bestowed by Jury Chair Julie Snow, FAIA. The 2007 honor awards also were presented. Medals were given to all past Architect of the Year recipients.

The 2008 Design Conference & Practice Management Symposium will take place Sept. 25-27 at the Vail Cascade Resort & Spa. SUMMARY OF 2007 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- AIA Denver partnered with the City and County of Denver and the Downtown Denver Partnership to review best practices from other cities' public works departments.

INCOME 2007

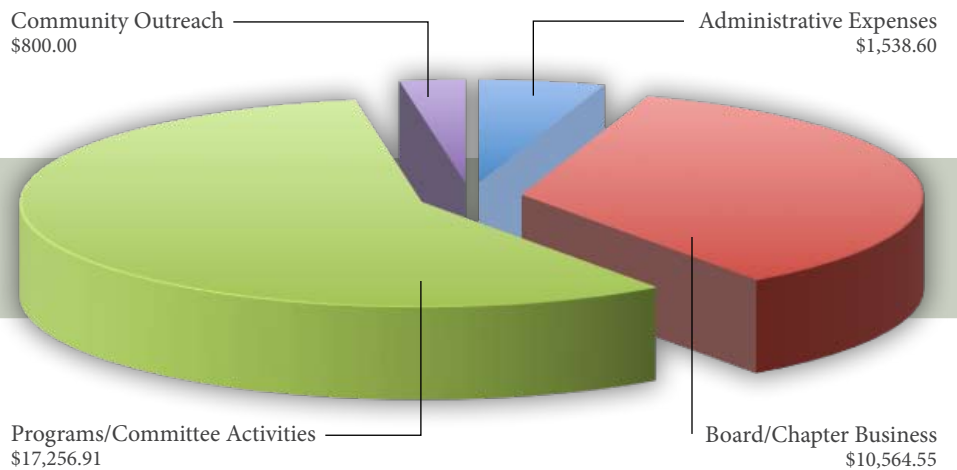
